

African forests in peril

Tropical forests across Africa are under relentless pressure. If the forests don't flourish, neither do the people nor the wildlife that depend on them.

Atewa Forest

Atewa Forest in Ghana is the finest example of upland evergreen forest in the Upper Guinean Forest region. It is home to more than 100 species currently at risk of extinction. **Five million people depend on the forest for a clean water supply**.

West Bugwe Forest, Uganda

West Bugwe is one of only three natural forests remaining in Eastern Uganda. Unfortunately unsustainable and unmanaged human activities are threatening its integrity. Yet, there is a local desire to conserve the forest through a process of collaborative forest management.

Dakatcha

Dakatcha is part of the fragmented Coastal Forests of Eastern Africa, counted as **one of the ten most threatened forest hotspots** in the world.



A Rocha's survey work has revealed a yet rich and diverse wildlife population with good numbers of the endemic Golden-rumped Sengi among 24 species of mammals, 200 birds and over 90 butterfly species – and counting.

Government has started assigning formal land titles in Dakatcha. This has resulted in a frenzy of land purchasing by speculators from far and wide – and an unprecedented level of destruction of this unique forest and its wildlife. There is an urgent need to secure what remaining forest there is before it is destroyed.

Kwande-Obanliku, Nigeria

Along the border of Cameroon in north-eastern Cross River, south-eastern Benue and southern Taraba States, Nigeria, lies an area of poorly-known lowland forest supporting many vulnerable wildlife populations.



The Government of Ghana is planning to mine bauxite deposits from the forest as repayment of Chinese loans. A Rocha Ghana is driving an international campaign to protect the forest as a National Park.

Objective

Core Interventions

Constituency Building

Our key activities will be varied as we continue to build meaningful relationships around a vision for these forests.

Practical forest & species conservation & research

Our interventions aim to directly improve the conservation status of the forest habitats and their wildlife through research, monitoring, habitat protection and restoration, and education.

Environmentally Sustainable Development

We aim to find ways to preserve the four landscapes which also meet local aspirations for development and income generation.

Regional cooperation

We want to work with partners to maximise our combined expertise for the benefit of these four forests and their inhabitants.

The difference we will make together

- Four landscapes across the African continent benefit from our collaborative approach with 50,000 ha of biodiversity-rich forest across Ghana, Nigeria, Kenya and Uganda better valued, understood, connected and cared for.
- 3,500 local people supported in sustainable development initiatives;
- Our achievements on the ground link-up with the international movement for sustainability.
